Photography Tips to Make Your Print Perfect!

After being cooped up inside for the past couple of months you're probably feeling the urge to change up your home décor. One of the easiest (and most rewarding) ways to do this is to get some of your own work printed. The options are endless whether you choose to go with a framed image, canvas or even metal. There a few tips and tricks you can use in your photography to make sure your image really pops!



Plan Ahead

Before you go about getting your print made, it is a great idea to decide where the image is going to go. Does the original image you were thinking of go with the current décor? Is it the correct colour, theme, size etc. You might have the most beautiful macro image of a pink flower, but if you are printing something to put in the shed it wouldn't make much sense!

Go To the Extremes

You are all most likely familiar with the terms 'negative' and 'positive' space. This simply refers to the subject of your photo and how much empty space there is around it. Photos with a good composition & balance of both negative & positive space always turn out great; but if you want something to really jump out off the wall try and switch things up! Try and use a photo that has only a very small subject, surrounded by large amounts of high contrast negative space for a minimalistic look. Alternatively, you can go to the other extreme and choose a photo that has little or no negative space whatsoever! A great example would be a close-up image of the Shibuya crossing in Japan.

Use Leading Lines

The easiest way to draw viewers into your images is to use leading lines, this holds up true for printing as well. Leading lines don't always need to be a physical object in your image either. You can create them using different lighting conditions, geometric shapes, or colour.



Use Bokeh

One of the easiest ways to make a photo look 'professional' is to make use of bokeh. One of the biggest differences between using an interchangeable lens camera & a phone is the ability to create a shallow depth of field. Whip out one of your favourite prime lenses, or telephoto & see if you can make the bokeh in your photo just as impressive as the subject itself.

Capture Movement

One of the jobs as a photographer is to get your photos to tell a story. Movement is a key aspect in telling a story and can be conveyed in a range of techniques. One of the most effective ways to create this in print form is to do a gallery wall or split prints. Use each individual print to tell part of the overall story, a start, middle and end. A great example is seen in the image below.



Edit for Printing

Over the years you will have watched plenty of videos, read plenty of articles all telling you the best settings for editing in lightroom & photoshop. You end up with your own style and settings that you

probably stick to for all of your images. The bad news is that your prints will look totally different. First thing to check is your colour space. Lots of people like to edit in Profoto or Adobe 1998 to get the maximum number of colours, but printers aren't able to replicate these colours. Before you can print your images out you will need to convert them to sRGB. The second major point is TURN DOWN THE BRIGHTNESS ON YOUR MONITOR! Everyone likes to use their monitors at max brightness. The problem with that is the big bright LEDS in your displays aren't there when you print the image out. You are best to keep your monitor at 50% brightness for all photo editing, but it is especially important when printing.



Despite all the above tips & tricks, the best way to pick the right photo to print is to just go with your gut. If you like the photo you are pick, even if it is unconventional, there is a good chance other people will too!
